I pre-enlisted in the summer of 65 knowing that I'd be drafted later in the year. I just got off a fire line 5 days earlier as a firefighter in Norther CA. Reported to the Mepps station in Oakland at 7 AM only to wait all day before being loaded on a bus at 6 PM. We arrived at Fort Ord at just about 9:55 where some crazed PFC boarded and screamed at us to get off the &*%\$# bus and go stand on a dot outside. The bus pulled away and somewhere off in the fog a bugle began playing TAPS. Welcome to Fort Ord. It was 2Nov65. We spent a week in the reception before going up on the hill. Our DI SSGT Ford was replaced about midway thru basic with SGT Lyons. What a difference in personalities!! Spent the next couple of months in H-3-3, 4th platoon with new found buds Tim Powers and Ray Cavagnaro. Unfortunately, haven't heard from either one since. Went on to AIT at Fort Holabird, went from one of the biggest forts to probably the smallest. My last visions of the Fort Ord of 66 are something akin to an ant hill with activity going on everywhere. I went by on my way to Monterey late last year and all I can say is that it saddened me to see the old fort looking like an old run-down war horse. They should never have closed Fort Ord. And Walter Kingsbury, if you're out there, you still owe me \$20!!!

The poor newly orphaned soldier then moved on to another trainee with his tragic story. Me, I stood there proudly knowing that I had done my good deed for the day. Finally we entered the classroom for our next one hour block of instruction in ways that a naive trainee can get conned out of their money. You can imagine how stupid and foolish I felt when the instructor told us about the dead mother con. Hey, who knows, maybe his mother really did die.
